Within our church family, we support each other by sharing stories, praying, and creating space for honest conversation. If this season feels blue for you, join us in honest worship and fellowship, finding strength in community and the presence of God. This Christmas, know that your struggles matter to God. May you experience the comfort of His love and the hope that comes from faith in Jesus. Even amid illness, loss, and grief, we have reason to rejoice: Christ is born, and His light shines in our darkest moments. You are not alone, and your church family is here to walk with you through every season. Amen.

A HUGE thank you to the women that pinned, sewed, and tied all the quilts. These women are great workers.



# Holding Sorrow and Praise: The Paradox of Faith

The holiday season is upon us. For many, this time of year brings images of warmth, family gatherings, and pure, unadulterated **joy**. But for many others, the holidays can sharpen the edges of **grief**, loneliness, and deep sorrow. Perhaps the hardest place to be is in the space where both realities exist—where you can be grieving a profound loss one moment and lifting your voice in praise the next.

This isn't a contradiction; it is the paradox of true faith.

# **The Psalms: A Sanctuary for All Emotions**

Our worship is honest because God's Word is honest. The Bible doesn't shy away from human suffering. In fact, many of the Psalms—the very hymnbook of ancient Israel—show us how to hold sorrow and worship at the very same time.

We see the Psalmist cry out in anguish, only to pivot to praise:

- **Sorrow and Pain:** "O Lord, why do you stand far away? Why do you hide yourself in times of trouble?" (Psalm 10:1)
- The Pivot to Praise: Yet, the same writer can proclaim, "I will give thanks to the Lord with my whole heart; I will recount all of your wonderful deeds." (Psalm 9:1)

And in one of the most powerful examples of holding both, the prophet Habakkuk, facing the imminent destruction of his nation, declares:

"Though the fig tree should not blossom, nor fruit be on the vines, the produce of the olive fail and the fields yield no food, the flock be cut off from the fold and there be no herd in the stalls, **yet I will rejoice in the Lord; I will take joy in the God of my salvation.**" (Habakkuk 3:17–18)

This is not a command to *fake* happiness. It is the spiritual strength to recognize that while our circumstances may be devastatingly painful, our **hope** in God remains unshakable. The praise isn't *for* the pain, but *in the midst* of it.

# The Hope of Christmas

As we light the Advent candles and sing carols, let us remember that the Christmas story itself is framed by this very paradox.

We sing of **joy to the world**, yet we are reminded that the world into which Jesus was born was filled with fear, poverty, and Roman oppression. This season doesn't ask us to ignore the sorrow, but rather to see that the birth of Christ is the reason we can sustain joy and hope *even when* sorrow is present.

# A Personal Note of Thanks

This year, this paradox has become intensely real for Ron and me.

We are navigating a season of profound sorrow, sadness, and pain as we deal with the progression of Ron's cancer, which has moved so quickly and with such overwhelming force. There are days when the grief threatens to consume every moment.

And yet, in the very next breath, we are filled with an overwhelming **joy** and **hopefulness**. This joy doesn't come from a denial of the reality we face, but from the incredible people God has placed in our lives—our **church family**. Your cards, your meals, your prayers, and your quiet presence are living, breathing examples of God's great love.

Thank you. Thank you for walking with us. Thank you for making space for our tears and, at the same time, giving us a reason to smile. You help us uphold the true meaning of this season.

We can experience all these complex emotions—the pain and the praise, the sorrow and the salvation—because of one great, eternal truth: **Emmanuel... God is with us.** 

May you feel His presence, whether in your deepest pain or your highest praise, this Christmas season.
